Gospel Reflection

Luke 12:13-21

As so often happens, Jesus tells a parable because someone has asked him a question. A man wants him to settle a squabble about an inheritance, but Jesus will have no part of it.

Concern about money prevents people from focusing on the reign of God. The parable of the rich farmer shows how foolish it is to keep piling up possessions. Right when the greedy man is gorging himself on food and drink, he dies. Death prevents any chance of reform.

How important is making money? Jesus knows that we all need enough to live on. Each person's need will be a little bit different. Each family's needs will be a little bit different. But Jesus warns here against piling up money and ignoring what really makes us rich - love of God and love of others.

In our society, we must all spend some time making money. How much time? How much of our thought and energy goes into this? How do we keep ourselves from spending too much time and energy on making money? Does our need to make money take too much time away from family and friends?

Of course, we do not work just for money. Every job is an opportunity to love God and others. How do you love God and others in your work? If your work is being a student, how do you love God and others while you are at school?

GUIDELINES FOR THE RECEPTION OF COMMUNION

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all. All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.

Eternal rest grant him O Lord

The blood of the Martyrs is the Seed of the Church ~ Tertullian
(Quintus Septimius Florens Tertullianus), c. 155 – c. 240 AD

Fr Jacques Hamel, murdered July 26 by Islamist terrorists at the age of 85, has been called the first priest-martyr of Western Europe in the 21st century.

But before his death, he insisted that holiness lay in ordinary life. On All Saints' Day last year, he wrote in the parish newsletter: "Do not think holiness is not for us." He told parishioners that holiness did not necessarily mean "doing extraordinary things", but could mean living a simple existence like that of the Martin family.

Fr Hamel was said to be a quiet man, a priest widely liked for his gentleness and constant availability. "He was always serving people," one parishioner told L'Express.

Fr Hamel was born in upper Normandy, only a few miles away from where his life would end, on November 30, 1930. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1958 and spent his life in five Normandy parishes in turn.

In an Easter reflection earlier this year, Fr Jacques said that Jesus "went to the end of love" by dying, and quoted John 15:13: "***Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.***"
