

Gospel Reflection

[John 21:1-19 or 21:1-14](#)

The title of this wonderful story from John's Gospel might be "Surprise Picnic at the Beach." In a very human way, it shows the great love Jesus and his friends had for one another. While the disciples are out fishing, the risen Christ appears on the shore at Lake Tiberias. They are anchored at a distance and do not recognize him. But when they follow his advice and wind up with a sagging net full of fish, John figures out that the stranger is Jesus. Coming ashore, they enjoy the picnic breakfast Jesus has prepared for them.

Although our reading stops after the meal itself, we know from the rest of the Gospel that Jesus called Peter aside after they ate. He asked Peter to "feed my lambs. Tend my sheep."

Reread the passages in this gospel passage in which Jesus tells the apostles to lower their net on the other side of the boat. Why do you think the apostles took Jesus' advice? Suppose they had had the know-it-all attitude, "Well, what does Jesus know about fishing? He was a carpenter, not a fisherman. We're the professionals here!" Where would this arrogance have gotten them?

Saint Benedict told his monks to be sure to ask the youngest in the monastery for advice, because often God reveals his will to the "least likely" person. What does this tell you about seeking an answer to a problem you might have?

We share a special meal as Jesus' disciples today. It is the Eucharist. We also recognize that Jesus calls us to care for others. How will you show your love to those who join in the celebration of the Eucharist with you?

The Catholic Home Missions Appeal will take place next week (April 16th / 17th). One way that this appeal works to support home mission dioceses in the United States is by supporting seminarian formation in poor dioceses. The blessing of seminarians places a financial burden on these dioceses, because educating each seminarian costs \$35-\$40K per year. How to Spiritually Prepare Your Child for First Communion

Take Your Child to Eucharistic Adoration

Pope John Paul II and the Holy Father Pope Benedict XVI have recommended children's Eucharistic adoration as a great way to prepare your children spiritually for their First Communion. Don't be concerned that your child won't understand what Eucharistic adoration is (you don't even have to use those words), or that they won't be able to sit quietly. Just tell your child that you are going to spend a few minutes sitting and talking with Jesus, and invite them to talk to Jesus too.

Note: Remember that children are easy believers, and spiritual realities are not often difficult for them to grasp when plainly explained. You may find that your child not only grasps the concept of Jesus' real presence in the Eucharist, but that they actually respond positively to the adoration experience.

Reinforce with Literature

Your child may not understand the Mass very well, but that doesn't mean that they can't participate in their own way and on their own level with what is happening. There are great children's Mass books and other Catholic children's books that explain Holy Communion. These books will help to reinforce your teaching about the specialness of Jesus in the Eucharist. If you bring books for your child to look at during Mass, make sure it's a children's missal or other Catholic children's catechesis books. Let Mass be a holy hour for your child just as it is for you.

With these simple tips you can begin preparing your child now for their special day with Jesus, when they receive Him for the first time in the sacrament of Holy Communion.

UPCOMING SAINTS AND FEASTS

Saint Stanislaus, Bishop and Martyr

Saint Martin I, Pope and Martyr

April 13

Elected *pope* in 649, *Martin I* had gotten in trouble for refusing to condone silence in the face of wrong. At that time there existed a popular heresy that held that **Christ** didn't have a human will, only a divine will. The emperor had issued an edict that didn't support Monothelism (as it was known) directly, but simply commanded that no one could discuss **Jesus' will** at all.

Monothelism was condemned at a council convened by *Martin I*. The council affirmed, once again, that since **Jesus** had two natures, human and divine, he had two wills, human and divine. The council then went further and condemned Constans edict to avoid discussion stating, "The **Lord** commanded us to shun evil and do good, but not to reject the good with the evil."

In his anger at this slap in the face, the emperor sent his soldiers to Rome to bring the pope to him. When *Martin I* arrived in Constantinople after a long voyage he was immediately put into prison. There he spent three months in a filthy, freezing cell while he suffered from dysentery. He was not allowed to wash and given the most disgusting food. After he was condemned for treason without being allowed to speak in his defense he was imprisoned for another three months.

From there he was exiled to the Crimea where he suffered from the famine of the land as well as the roughness of the land and its people. But hardest to take was the fact that the *pope* found himself friendless. His letters tell how his own church had deserted him and his friends had forgotten him. They wouldn't even send him oil or corn to live off of.

He died two years later in exile in the year 656, a *martyr* who stood up for the *right* of the Church to establish doctrine even in the face of imperial power.
